The target this year is to ensure all children have at least 96% attendance.

Attendance for the academic year is 92.6%

Attendance Matters

We think that attendance matters!

It is essential that we continue to work together to do all we can to prioritise the children's attendance at school so that they can maximise their learning and secure the benefits achieved through socialising with their peers.

The profile of attendance is a key priority for schools and as such we have been instructed to start to implement stricter measures for unauthorised and repeated absences. Our school attendance policy has been developed to meet the criteria laid out in the Department for Education's Working Together to Improve School Attendance.

You will see that **our attendance target is 96%** again this year. **Our current whole school attendance is 92.5%**; therefore, we have work to do!

Good attendance is important because...

Statistics show that pupils with good attendance have higher attainment in school and studies show that children with attendance above 96% make better progress socially and academically than their peers with lower attendance. When absent, children miss out on vital learning, which can quickly develop into substantial gaps. Following the considerable impact that COVID has had on children's education already, it is essential that children are in school as much as possible. For our younger children, both attendance and punctuality are doubly important as they move straight into their phonics groups after the register has been taken.

Recording Absences

Unfortunately, there are circumstances when a child is unable to attend due to illness, medical appointments or unforeseeable events. In these instances, parents / carers need to follow the procedures indicated below. The school may insist on further evidence to support authorised absences, as outlined in the Attendance Policy.

Child is unable to attend school and requries an authorised absence.

Parent / Carer contacts the school office by 9am.

Expected return date is indicated.

The child returns to school at the soonest possible time.

Parent / Carer phones the school office by 9am of the expected return date to inform of further absence. New expected return date is indicated.

Happy Hares

This term in Happy Hares we have been exploring farms. We looked at what animals live on the farm, making our own small world farms, what the animals eat and what shelter they live in. We then explored what grows on the farm where we looked at rice, cereal, vegetables, made our own bread and tried porridge. We went on to look at what jobs the tractors do on the farm where one of our year 2 children bought all of his tractors and machinery in and showed Happy Hares how they worked and what their job was. Finally, as the daffodils and tulips started to grow we looked at Spring, we went on a spring scavenger hunt and looked at the lifecycle of chicks where we got to go on a egg hunt during forest school looking for warm and safe places where eggs might be.






Little Owls

This term we have been working on our STEM project. We have been exploring how we can recycle everyday materials to make them into new things. We have designed, made and flown our own kites. We thought about what materials work best and how to make the structure so it can fly high on a windy day! In our maths this term we have been focused on composition of numbers and number bonds to 10! We have explored lots of different ways to make numbers to 10 and learned those pairs of numbers that add up to 10! We've even explored making numbers to 20! Our Talk 4 Writing story has been 'Little Rabbit Foo Foo' the cheeky rabbit is bopping all of the animals on the head! We learned the story off by heart and loved pretending to be Goonies!









Owls

We have had great fun exploring snowmobiles. Our paper prototypes helped us to understand how to use our designs to create a model. We found lots of problems to solve. We are very proud of the snowmobiles we made using lots of problem solving to attach the wheels to the axle so that they can still turn easily.



In our Maths learning we have been problem solving using multiplication and division. We can use a part whole model to help divide into equal groups.

We loved finding out about the adventures of Sophie in Antarctica. She travelled on an icebreaker called Aurora Astralis. We wrote instructions to help Sophie get dressed in her polar outfit. She was very cosy and safe.

Forest school has been amazing again! We have explored the changing season and met some adorable lambs. We know Spring is a time for new life with buds and blossoms growing in our Forest School area. They helped us to think about the Easter story.





Swifts

We have had another very busy term in Swifts class, focusing on our STEM project of 'Unlocking the River Diglis'. We have been researching, designing and making a device using linkages and levers that could be used to carefully catch and monitor the ancient twaite shad. The children were very passionate about looking after wildlife, and showed compassion, resilience, and trust in each other whilst building them!

On World Book Day, we took part in many activities to get us all excited about reading. Swifts had some fabulous costumes and enjoyed taking part in the BBC's live lesson about story writing using our favourite fairy tales.

In writing we have been practising our use of speech through 'The Papaya that Spoke', and some strange objects started appearing in Swifts with some strange scenarios to write about!

The children have also taken part in the girl's football festival and a hockey tournament, and once again made us very proud with their hard work and fantastic sportsmanship- well done Swifts!






Falcons

Falcons have settled really well with Mr Harris and Mrs Low and all of the children have been making a fantastic effort with their learning. Year Six, in particular, have been demonstrating their readiness for high school with their excellent attitude and application. Our history topic this half term has been the Anglo-Saxons and Vikings and the children have thoroughly enjoyed using primary sources to discover amazing facts and discoveries. Alongside this topic we have shared the story of Beowulf and focused on creating some vivid character descriptions. We cannot wait until we go on our trip to Bishop's Wood after Easter, to find out even more about this time in history.

Falcons have also been busy working incredibly hard tackling a STEM project that has required teamwork, problem solving and resilience. Posed with the challenge of recovering infrastructure



following a natural disaster, the children have designed and are currently constructing scale models of cranes. They have given considerable consideration to the structural integrity required and will be progressing to the mechanical aspects when we return in the summer term. Throughout the project to date, they have impressed us with the attitude and commitment they have demonstrated to a very demanding task!!





Sports Events

Swimming this term was attended by our Year 2's, who have learned all things from entering and exiting the pool safely to swimming front crawl and backstroke unaided (Freddie and Spencer). Our last scheduled half term of swimming will be for our Year R and Year 3.

On Wednesday 8th March it was International Women's Day and it seemed appropriate that we took a group of girls from Years 3 and 4 along to King Charles Secondary to take part in the annual Football Festival. There were about 10 activities taking place, varying from warm up drills to passing, dribbling and shooting.

Friday 17th March saw us enter the KS2 Hockey Comps for the first time, with us entering Years 3 and 4 as well as Years 5/6 events. The Falcons team performed admirably well winning two of their group games and finishing 6th out of 10 overall. Astonishing defensive work from Ned and Harrison ensured we only conceded the odd goal, even to the competition winners. Max showed his goal scoring prowess by scoring 7 out of 8 of our goals, with five coming in one game! The Swifts team was superbly led by Mrs Wood to attain 6th place out of 16 teams, and winning 4 out of 8 games.

March has also seen us enter the Girls Netball League also for the first time. Despite coming up against teams with a lot more experience and height we managed to hold our own in most games, winning two and drawing two out of our seven fixtures. This will be a great learning curve for next year, when we will be a year better trained and hopefully a few inches taller!

Finally, a massive well done to Thomas who represented Wyre Forest in the recent County Cross Country Championships and came a fantastic 16th out of 40 runners, from Herefordshire and Worcestershire.


Next term is already fully booked with Tag Rugby, Tri-Golf, Athletics, Boccia, Tennis, Cricket and Rounders on the menu.
